

Lipedema:

A Choice Between Fiscal Responsibility and Preventable High-Cost Care

Est. 1 in 10 Women

Stage 1 & 2 - Early Intervention

ESTIMATED ANNUAL COST:
\$1,500 – \$3,000 per year

(Fully covered conservative care prevents progression)

- Custom Compression Garments: ~\$500 – \$1,000/year (2 sets)
- Manual Lymphatic Drainage (MLD): ~\$800 – \$1,200/year (Maintenance therapy)
- Pneumatic Compression Pump: ~\$1,000 (One-time cost, lasts years)

The Financial Reality:

This is a predictable, low-cost preventative investment that keeps women mobile, healthy, and active in the workforce. Covering basic tools and early therapy helps halt disease progression.

Stage 3 & 4 - Late-Stage Crisis Care

ESTIMATED CRISIS COST:
\$65,000 – \$120,000+ total

(Completely preventable system shock due to medical misdiagnosis)

- Multi-Stage Specialized Surgeries: \$30,000 – \$60,000 (3 to 4 required surgeries at \$10,000–\$15,000+ each for legs, abdomen, arms)
- Total Joint Replacements: \$35,000 – \$50,000 (Knee/hip replacements due to orthostatic joint breakdown caused by the weight of untreated Lipedema)
- Wound Care & Lymphedema Therapy: \$5,000+ (Treating skin ulcerations and permanent lymphatic failure)

The Financial Reality:

Insurers avoid a small cost today, but taxpayers pay the price tomorrow through lost workforce participation and state-funded disability.

The Status Quo is Bad Fiscal Policy:

Insurers deny a \$500 compression garment today, only to be forced to pay for a \$50,000 joint replacement and permanent disability support tomorrow. Early diagnosis doesn't cost the system money; it saves the system millions.
